The Law of the Harvest *by Counselor James Gardner*



In this time of harvest, I have been pondering about the concept of reaping what we sow and the difficulty, hardship and doubt that arises when the harvest we have planted for, nurtured for, prepared for, planned for, worked for, sacrificed for and prayed for never seems to come or appears to produce unexpected or unwanted fruit.

The Lord taught the parable of planting a seed and taught that the good ground “are they, which in an honest and good heart, having heard the word, keep it, and bring forth fruit with patience.” It isn’t always easy to wait upon the Lord, especially if we feel the ground we were given may be difficult. I remember planting a garden with my grandma in the Arizona desert. We dug up the hard clay ground in her backyard and plowed little rows and planted okra and squash and tomatoes and we watered the seeds thoroughly. I left and came back in a few days and ran out to the garden to see if it was ready to harvest. I ran into the house and told my grandma that nothing was growing and that we must have done something wrong, and she said, “You need to be patient James, sometimes plants in the desert take longer to grow.”

Sometimes the ground we are given may be difficult, hindered by trials and adversity, but the blessings will come. The interesting thing about desert plants is that for the first part of life, the plants will put all their effort into growing strong roots; they dig deeper and grow wider in order to help the plant survive. Once the roots are formed and ready, then the plant will begin to grow upward and produce. Sometimes we may not see the growth that is happening in our life, and when this occurs it can be frustrating and discouraging, but we are promised that if we continue to nourish those seeds, they will grow and the fruits will be great.

Amulek teaches us about patience in our harvest. He planted many good seeds, he helped Alma when no one else would, followed the promptings of angels and the spirit, preached to the people in his city and converted many. Not long afterward, he was persecuted for his belief and was forced to watch his family and friends be burned for their faith. His soul was wounded to the point that he asked, perhaps in hope of relief from the pain he was feeling, “Perhaps they will burn us too,” but Alma answered that his work was not yet finished. So it can be with us. At times we may feel discouraged, alone or wounded, to the point where we may want to give up, give in to sin, allow our faith to give in to doubt; but we have work left to do. Left, Primary President Linda Kay Waters helped the children learn their songs by donning more and more items of apparel when they did a good job. The kids were delighted!







No One Can Do What A Righteous Woman Can Do!

These are the words spoken by President Russell M. Nelson at the general women's session of October conference. "My dear sisters, we need you! We need your strength, your conversion, your conviction, your ability to lead, your wisdom, and your voices," said President Nelson. "We simply cannot gather Israel without you."

President Nelson invited us to do four things:

- 1. Participate in a 10-day fast** from social media and from any other negative or impure media.
- 2. Read the Book of Mormon between now and the end of the year.**
- 3. Establish a pattern of regular temple attendance.**
- 4. Participate fully in Relief Society.**

President Nelson said: "My dear sisters, you have spiritual gifts and propensities. ... I urge you, with all the hope of my heart, to pray to understand your spiritual gifts—to cultivate, use and expand them, even more than you ever have. You will change the world as you do."

to preach the gospel to thousands and thousands. His spiritual power after overcoming this unwanted, unexpected harvest was great enough to tumble the walls of the prisons which surrounded him. In the process of digging up, plowing and replanting with patience, we become spiritually stronger and more able servants of our Heavenly Father.

There are no easy answers to questions of delayed, unexpected or prolonged harvests. One could say that things will work out in the end, but that may not give comfort to those who are feeling discouraged or alone. It is difficult when we are standing in the midst of our barren ground to not look upward and ask "Why?" Answers may not come readily to the question "Why?" But if we instead ask the questions, "Who can I serve?" "What would you have me do?" "What can I learn?" the answers often come more quickly and it will be easier to find joy in the process of planting seeds - seeds of service, seeds of love, seeds of trust, seeds of patience. As we are faithful and trust in God, we will find that the Lord will teach us and use us in His work. Like waiting for a seed to grow in desert clay, it may take time, work, tears and fears, but the harvest will come. Perhaps it will arrive in unforeseen ways and perhaps when we least expect it, but the promised harvest will come.


Church Schedule Changes

“Church leaders have announced changes to the Sunday meeting schedule, beginning in January 2019, in connection with the release of a new home-centered, Church-supported curriculum. These changes and others build upon several prior initiatives the Church has set in motion in recent years, meant to help members focus their lives more fully on Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ and deepen faith in Them. These initiatives include a focus on more meaningful study of the gospel at home, honoring the Lord by keeping the Sabbath day holy, and caring for one another as the Savior would and as directed by the Spirit.”

Beginning in January 2019, each Sunday service will consist of a two-hour block divided between a one-hour Sacrament Meeting, a 10-minute transition time, and an alternating 50-minute class period for Sunday School or Priesthood, Relief Society, Young Women and Young Men. The Primary will meet each week during the second hour.

“In addition to encouraging gospel study, Church leaders renewed their invitation for all to participate on the Sabbath day—and throughout the week—in family councils, home evening, family history and temple work, ministering, personal worship, and joyful family time.”
