## In Faith We Feel God's Love *by Randon Jensen*





I am sure many of you have noticed this scene (photo below) on about 100 South as you drive north on Orchard Drive. As the snow in this picture shows, this tree did not recently collapse this fence. In fact, I know I have driven past this scene for many, many months. And, every time I do, I think about how it serves as a metaphor for those times in our lives when something drastic happens. When life, a tree, or coronavirus hits and we just think, "Oh man, that is too much! I can't fix that. I can't deal with that right now."

And sometimes, that may be true. Maybe, full [tree] removal is impossible for the time being; maybe there is a bone-deep sadness that is too tender to face in full; maybe there is a heart break that is just out of our control to fully heal or avoid; maybe there are earthquakes that come in the night, or pandemics that cross oceans. Sometimes, we all have to sit with grief, or as Eli Wiesel put it once, "to know the dark [we] go dark." That is part of mortality. And, we have eternity to make things right in partnership with our Savior. We don't have to face all our fallen trees and fix them now.

What I also love about this scene is what HAS been done. The tree has been cut down to lessen the damage and reach of the destruction. And I love the little Buddha statue placed to the side of the smashed fence, its head resting on its knee in peaceful repose. Calm amid the storm. To me, the picture says, "I may need help beyond what I can do right now to remove this tree, fix the fence and get 'back to normal,' but I can control the tree's influence and reach. Most importantly, I can choose to find peace in the storm. I can find a buddha, next to the smashed fence, creating a place of calm in a scene of derailment."

My prayer is that we can all find ways to find that peace and resilience while we deal with the derailment of quarantine: walks outside, warm showers, honest and open personal prayer, dark chocolate .... I hope we don't spend too much time worrying about the things that are out of our control.

Sisters, we love you! "Thank you" to each of you for your beauty and strength and humor in this time of quarantine. We are so grateful for every act of love and service and kindness. And a special "thank you" to all who sewed masks for Project Protect. You are just incredible.

## Temple & Family History May 2020

Temples are still closed. It is expected that they will be closed through the month of May. After that we are not sure how long the closure will last. In the meantime, there is a great opportunity to prepare for when the temples will be open again.

During this closure period we can spend time in Family Search online. There is a lot that we can do. For example, do you have buried in a box somewhere a history of an ancestor or an experience that might be shared about an ancestor? These things can be added to the ancestor’s page in family search under “Memories”.

There are also a lot of fun activities that an individual or a family can do in Family Search. When signed into Family Search you will find at the top of the screen a list of things to do. One of those is “Activities.” Just click on it and you will find a list of things to do that might be fun, entertaining and informative.

Most individuals who sign in to Family Search will find hints and other bits of information about an ancestor or several ancestors. In our ward there are at least 255 members who have a record hint or a discovery experience available about an ancestor(s). Let’s take the opportunity to log in to Family Search and check things out.
