Temple & Family History

June 2020

Temples are still closed for proxy ordinance work. We still do not know when work for our ancestors will begin again. Some ordinance work for living individuals has begun but only with a minimum of temple workers and others present. So what should be our “Temple Focus” when the temple is closed?

President Russell M. Nelson recently shared a thought for us. “While worshipping in the temple is presently not possible, I invite you to increase your participation in family history, including family history research and indexing. I promise that as you increase your time in temple and family history work, you will increase and improve your ability to hear Him.”

Elder David A. Bednar shared this thought about keeping our temple covenants. “We do not come to the temple to hide from or escape the evils of the world. Rather, we come to the temple to conquer the world of evil. As we invite into our lives the “power or godliness” by receiving priesthood ordinances and making and keeping sacred covenants, we are blessed with strength beyond our own to overcome the temptations and challenges of mortality and to do and become good.”

We can review ordinances in our mind. We can silently visualize the ordinances and ponder the wording and the meaning of the ordinances. We can renew our covenants by partaking of the sacrament.

We can turn to the scriptures and look for the temple in them. Helaman 10:6-7 points out that what we seal on earth is also sealed in heaven. We can also learn about covenants in Matthew 19:16-20. Take time to read these scriptures. You might also search the scriptures further for the importance of temples.

The presidency of the Bountiful Temple and a few others who have been in the temple since the closure have made an important observation that has been very noticeable and that is that an amazing reverence has been experienced. They hope that when the temple opens again that all who enter the temple will do so with a renewed desire to keep the level of holiness and reverence that has been felt there in recent weeks. Reverence is not just being quiet. It is much more. A talk given by Elder Lionel Kendrick of the Seventy in the April 2001 General Conference discusses this subject.

So until the temple is fully open again, we can do some of the things mentioned to keep the temple importance near to us.

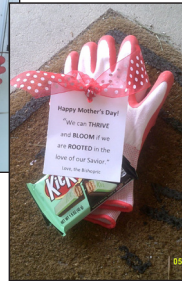

Dear Ward Members, **RE: 5th WARD CHURCH MEETINGS**

As you have seen in the media, our Church leaders (working in conjunction with the Governor's directive) are now beginning to allow sacrament meeting in our church houses. I have been meeting with our stake leaders to discuss how to meet safely under the guidelines the Church leaders have outlined. Here are a few of the details for the meeting:

When and how to start again:

- Each ward will hold one sacrament meeting in June and twice in July.
- **Our day to meet is June 28th at 9 a.m.**
- The meeting will be no longer than 45 minutes. There will be one speaker.
- Singing is approved, but NO use of hymn books or printed programs. Please plan to use your own electronic device for the hymns.
- Each ward decides whether to hold more than one sacrament meeting on their assigned day. If more than 99 members want to meet, we will hold a second meeting that day. Time to be determined due to cleaning after the meeting.
- Sit in every other row only (this will facilitate the passing of the sacrament, we encourage six (6) feet between families).
- Masks are encouraged for members, but not required
- It's OK to socialize – larger groups perhaps go outside after the meeting.
- Each ward determines how and when to clean after the meeting. We will discuss, but most likely we will ask for 5 or 6 volunteers to stay and help clean the building.

Handling the sacrament:

- Those blessing the sacrament will sanitize hands multiple times.
- Those preparing and administering sacrament wear masks.
- Space the bread out on each tray (not touching) – for example 10-15 pieces per tray.
- Those administering the sacrament always hold the trays (do not hand off to members).
- Water cups are spaced on the trays, i.e., approximately 12-15 cups per tray instead of the normal.
- One priesthood holder carries the tray with the water and another carries an empty tray to collect the used cups
- We will hold a simple training for the young men before the first sacrament meeting.

Those not attending may continue to have the sacrament at home, encouraged to do so at least monthly. PLEASE let me know if you are in need of the sacrament at home. We want to encourage ministering brothers to reach out to families to ensure the sacrament is readily available each Sunday. Those attending but not comfortable taking the sacrament at the meeting may continue to have the sacrament at home per the Church's guidelines.

These are a few of the guidelines that we will be following. Over the next few weeks, we would like to hear back from you if you will or will not be attending so we can plan the day accordingly. I want to be clear again that those not comfortable attending, especially those in a high-risk category per state guidelines, should not attend. There is no reason to feel anxious about this. The only one required to attend is the Bishop. :)

PLEASE LET THE BISHOPRIC KNOW IF YOU ARE PLANNING TO ATTEND. This will help us to know if a second meeting is needed that day.

I am excited to get back together. I look forward to working on this phased approach until we can begin having our full meetings again. I appreciate our church leadership and their caring manner in outlining how to meet and stay safe. I love you and looking forward to June 28th with much anticipation.
